For eHealth Saskatchewan, the 2024-25 fiscal year was another opportunity to demonstrate how our innovation, collaboration and unwavering commitment to patients, health care providers and citizens guides everything we do.

Though eHealth touches every aspect of health care in Saskatchewan, our efforts are largely behind the scenes. We provide the information technology (IT) infrastructure and systems the health system relies on to care for the people of this province. From everyday office equipment like laptops and phones to cutting-edge technology in labs, hospitals and long-term care facilities, we support more than 1,000 clinical and business applications in over 430 facilities province-wide. Making it all happen is a complement of more than 800 dedicated employees in 20 Saskatchewan communities.

We've shared highlights of our work on page 8 and I'd like to call out a few that demonstrate our focus on client and patient service.

eHealth is there through the planning, renovation and construction of new or upgraded health care facilities across the province. From the earliest stages, we were part of planning and construction of the Regina Urgent Care Centre, which helps to alleviate pressure on emergency departments by offering urgent and mental health treatment to patients. We continue to support capital projects in hospitals, clinics and long-term care facilities that enable improved patient care and make life easier for doctors, nurses and other health care providers. We also provide the systems that make virtual care possible, particularly for rural and remote communities. We're proud that 28 emergency departments can now rely on the Virtual Physician Program to connect patients and providers, complementing in-person care.

MySaskHealthRecord celebrated five years of putting health information into patients' hands. With more than 721,000 users, MySaskHealthRecord has become an example for the rest of Canada to follow when it comes to making health information accessible for patients, reducing anxiety and helping them prepare for appointments.

Our Health Registries and Vital Statistics team has focused on improving client service this past year, bringing down wait times and optimizing processes. Customer-centric website improvements make requesting health cards and vital event certificates online the easiest and quickest option. Newly implemented coaching tools help the team resolve any issue or question the first time you contact them.

Health care providers, funeral homes and loved ones are benefitting from a new online death registration platform. Submitting information electronically speeds up and simplifies the process for providers. Ultimately, loved ones obtain the certificates they need to settle estates and finalize decisions more quickly than in the past.

eHealth is a unique place to work, and I'm proud that once again we've been recognized as one of the top employers in Saskatchewan. eHealth employees are committed to making life better for the people of this province with technology that enables health care and improves access. We often say that the best thing about working at eHealth is the people. Everyone brings a spirit of innovation and problem-solving, working as a team to address the needs of the patients, providers and citizens we serve.

Our health system partners continue to support us while we meet the challenges of today's health sector. We work together for accessible health care and better outcomes for patients, and we all shoulder the weight of making that happen within our own areas of expertise. We're committed to strengthening our ties and working even more collaboratively with our partners moving forward.

Authority and Mandate

eHealth Saskatchewan is a Treasury Board Crown Corporation. Our Orders in Council outline our objectives, purpose and powers. We are subject to orders or directives by the Treasury Board.

Key roles of eHealth, driven by our mandate, include:

- consolidate all information technology (IT) services provided by former Saskatchewan health regions, Saskatchewan Cancer Agency and 3sHealth into a single service provided by eHealth
- lead Saskatchewan Electronic Health Record planning and strategy
- administer and operate *The Vital Statistics Act* and *The Change of Name Act*
- administer and operate the health registration registry (Person Health Registration System)
- procure, implement, own, operate or manage other health information systems
- enter into agreements or arrangements to market IT or expertise to other governments, international agencies, commercial or non-profit organizations

The eHealth Board of Directors is appointed by Order in Council in accordance with *The Crown Corporations Act, 1993*. The Board fulfills its governance role by overseeing and providing direction to the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) and all individuals who report directly to the CEO about the conduct of the business, affairs and effective management of eHealth.

The Board is accountable to, and reports to, the Minister of Health. The Board acts in the best interests of eHealth and is responsible for its stewardship on behalf of the public, including but not limited to, promoting the organization's vision, mission, values, objectives and purposes, as well as ensuring good governance.

eHealth provides technology services to all provincial health partners, including Saskatchewan Health Authority, Saskatchewan Cancer Agency, Health Quality Council, the Ministry of Health, 3sHealth, Athabasca Health Authority and private practice community providers, including physicians, pharmacists and allied health professionals.

As of March 31, 2025, eHealth had 820 employees in 20 communities in Saskatchewan.

eHealth manages, refreshes and supports IT assets in 433 locations across the health system. eHealth also administers vital statistics and health card registries and provides MySaskHealthRecord, an online platform that gives citizens access to their health information.

Honouring Land, Building Relationships

eHealth operates in Treaty 2, 4, 5, 6, 8 and 10 territory and the homeland of the Métis. The facilities and services we support provide health care to the Nakota, Nehiyaw, Nehinaw, Nehitaw, Nahkawe, Dakota, Dene, Lakota and Métis people of Saskatchewan.

eHealth is committed to fostering and maintaining respectful relationships with First Nations and Métis people. In 2024-25, eHealth employees completed *4 Seasons of Reconciliation* training as part of our commitment to understanding Indigenous histories, cultures and values so we can create a better future together.

2024-25 PROGRESS AND HIGHLIGHTS

Year in Review

- Recognized as one of Saskatchewan's Top Employers for 2025 by the editors of *Canada's Top 100 Employers*.
- Celebrated five years of MySaskHealthRecord, giving Saskatchewan residents quick and easy online access to personal health information through a secure, personalized login.
- Celebrated 11 years of Panorama, a system that securely stores all public health immunization data for Saskatchewan citizens.
- Surpassed 31,500 registered donors on the Organ and Tissue Donor Registry, a service supported by eHealth and available on saskatchewan.ca.
- Launched the Electronic Death Registration and Notification system to make registering a death and getting a death certificate in Saskatchewan easier for providers and loved ones. The new paperless process reduces wait times and makes it less stressful for families to handle estates and other details.
- Supported the opening of the Regina Urgent Care Centre, the first facility of its kind in Saskatchewan, combining services to help optimize a patient's journey through our health system and reduce pressure on emergency rooms.
- Took significant steps to modernize and stabilize the IT infrastructure the health system relies on, including network equipment, network security, wireless internet, phones and datacentre hardware.
- Supported hospital and long-term care construction in seven locations across the province with IT infrastructure planning, design and procurement to help provide better access to care.
- Helped provide opportunities for Saskatchewan residents to receive emergency health care services as close to home as possible by expanding the Virtual Physician Program from five to 28 emergency departments.
- Expanded the Lab Information System to five new facilities in the province, giving more patients and providers convenient and secure access to lab results.
- Improved processes, procedures and resources to help our Service Desk resolve issues more quickly. Answering 93 per cent of calls within 60 seconds means health care providers can get back to the important work of treating patients.
- Introduced new scanning technology for leg and foot prostheses, improving and speeding up the process to fit and create a prosthesis.

IT Modernization

eHealth's work behind the scenes empowers providers to access information and provide quality care. Modernizing and stabilizing information technology (IT) in 433 locations across the province is an ongoing process. eHealth regularly upgrades equipment and infrastructure to ensure technology and information is there when providers and patients need it. As the health system expands, the number, size and complexity of projects grows significantly.

Replacing and renewing technology

During 2024–25, eHealth continued vital infrastructure modernization efforts to directly support patient care and clinical operations across Saskatchewan. These investments ensure clinicians have reliable, secure, and timely access to the digital tools, patient information, and clinical systems required for informed decision-making, faster diagnoses, and uninterrupted delivery of care. The result is a more resilient, connected health system that better serves patients and care teams alike.

Key initiatives include:

- Replacing and upgrading network infrastructure in 60 facilities, including enhanced wireless capabilities, to ensure providers can reliably connect to the clinical applications and digital tools necessary for patient care.
- Modernizing processors, memory, networking, and storage infrastructure in major acute care sites to support patient flow, improve system performance, and expand capacity for delivery of care.
- Refreshing servers at 13 facilities to strengthen data access, system stability, and security to support patient safety, co-ordination of care, and seamless collaboration across multidisciplinary teams.
- Upgrading over 100 network switches and other equipment across 29 locations to ensure stable, secure access to IT systems, patient records, diagnostic images, and administrative tools, minimizing disruptions and enhancing workflows.

SPOTLIGHT

Technology to support personalized care

In 2024–25, eHealth worked with the Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA) and the Ministry of Health to streamline flow of genomics data for respiratory infection testing. This means faster, easier access for labs, and public health teams to help people get better care. Genomics testing and data access can transform health care by providing a better understanding of genetics and how it affects treatment response and disease risk. It enables personalized medicine, drug discovery and disease prevention.

New technology for faster and better fitting prostheses

A new scanning technology for leg and foot prostheses improves patient experience and access. It replaces plaster forms and provides a better fitting prosthetic in fewer steps. The process takes less time and results in a more comfortable prosthetic at less cost.

Stabilizing core services

While balancing day-to-day operations, eHealth also undertakes significant work to enhance and expand the performance, reliability and capacity of more than 1,000 clinical systems and applications. These systems are essential for delivering care - from surgical services and emergency treatment to lab diagnostics, virtual visits, and long-term care. Enhancing their functionality ensures clinicians can make informed decisions, reduces delays for patients, and improves overall health system responsiveness.

Examples of this work include:

- Upgrading all instances of the acute electronic medical record system used in hospitals, including emergency departments and inpatient care settings. This upgrade improves system stability, strengthens privacy and security, and enhances integration with other clinical tools, enabling faster access to patient information and smoother workflows across teams.
 - Expanding and upgrading the surgical scheduling system used in operating rooms across Saskatchewan. Enhancements streamlined workflows, optimized surgical resources, and improved communication - helping reduce wait times and increase access to timely surgical care.
 - Expanding the Laboratory Information System to five additional sites, bringing the total to 57. This supports faster turnaround times for diagnostic results, which are accessible to patients through MySaskHealthRecord and to providers through the electronic health record - enabling more timely treatment decisions.
 - Upgrading Saskatchewan Virtual Visit, the platform enabling video-based care delivery in rural and remote areas. The improvements enhance audio and video quality as well as reliability, which is critical for supporting the Virtual Physician Program and maintaining access to care where in-person visits may be difficult.
- Enhancing the long-term care (LTC) and mental health clinical documentation system to support additional facilities across the province. This expansion enables more LTC home and recovery centres to transition from paper to digital documentation, improving the consistency, accuracy, and timeliness of patient records.
 - Expanding the LTC Quality Indicator initiative to one-third of all LTC homes in the province. This enables better tracking of resident outcomes and supports data-driven improvement to quality of life and care planning in LTC.

Service Excellence: Enabling Care Through Reliable IT Support

Reliable, responsive information technology (IT) operations are essential for health care providers to deliver safe, effective, and timely care. In 2024–25, eHealth continued to strengthen the IT foundation that supports more than 75,000 users across Saskatchewan’s health system. By streamlining services, standardizing support, and modernizing tools, eHealth ensures clinical teams can stay focused on what matters most: caring for patients.

Highlights from 2024–25 include:

- **Leveraging a provincial IT service management platform** to manage incidents and Service Desk requests. This improves ticket tracking and enables more self-service options, freeing up Service Desk agents to prioritize urgent clinical issues and restore system access quickly.
- **Standardizing IT services provincewide**, ensuring consistent, reliable support regardless of location. This reduces variation and improves provider confidence in the systems that underpin their work.
- **Realigning resources** to deliver provincial-level IT services that remain responsive to local needs. This hybrid approach supports seamless, dependable service for clinical users in all regions.
- **Upgrading call centre operations** with a single cloud-based platform and standardized analyst training, ensuring faster, more effective resolution of issues that impact patient care.
- **Achieving high service responsiveness**, with 93 per cent of Service Desk calls answered in under 60 seconds and the majority of email tickets addressed within 24 hours—minimizing disruptions and helping providers return to patient care faster.

SPOTLIGHT

Regina Urgent Care Centre information flow

In 2024-25, eHealth worked with the SHA to implement integrated clinical services for the new Urgent Care Centre in Regina. This work focused on establishing seamless information flow between the new Centre and existing clinical systems related to medical imaging, laboratory results and the eHR Viewer. The Centre provides treatment for urgent, non-life-threatening illnesses or injuries as well as mental health needs, reducing strain on emergency rooms and improving the patient experience.

Health System Priorities

eHealth works in close partnership with the Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA), Saskatchewan Cancer Agency, 3sHealth, the Ministry of Health, and others to advance the province’s health system priorities. Together, we align expertise and resources to strengthen care delivery, improve access, and empower patients, ensuring the people of Saskatchewan receive the care they need, when and where they need it.

Empowering patients through digital access

MySaskHealthRecord is one of Canada’s leading patient portals and a cornerstone of eHealth’s commitment to transparency, empowerment, and patient engagement. This secure platform lets citizens access their personal health information from lab results and prescriptions to clinical visit histories all in one place. Now in its fifth year, it boasts the highest per capita usage in Canada, with more comprehensive data access than any other province. In 2024–25, registrations grew by 4 per cent, rising from 694,000 to over 721,000 users, helping more people take an active role in managing their health.

MySaskHealthRecord gives people in Saskatchewan secure online access to their lab results, imaging, prescriptions, and more. This helps patients stay informed and take a more active role in their health.

Helping providers see the whole picture

The Electronic Health Record Viewer gives authorized health care providers a complete view of a patient’s history regardless of where care was delivered. This supports safer care, especially in emergencies.

Expanding access with virtual care

eHealth plays a critical role in expanding virtual care across Saskatchewan, helping to bridge geographic gaps and ensure more equitable access to health services. Virtual care reduces patient travel, improves safety, and enhances the overall care experience.

In 2024–25, eHealth worked with the SHA to expand the **Virtual Physician Program** from five to 28 rural emergency departments, bringing emergency medical expertise to communities where on-site physicians may not be immediately available.

At the heart of this program is **Saskatchewan Virtual Visit**, the secure video platform that enables real-time clinical consultations between patients and physicians - delivering timely care while keeping patients closer to home.

Saskatchewan Virtual Visit makes it easier for patients to meet with providers by video, especially in rural and remote areas. It reduces travel, supports continuity of care, and increases access to services. In 2024-25, Saskatchewan Virtual Visit increased:

Access to medical imaging across the province

The medical imaging storage system (Picture Archiving and Communication System) securely stores and shares X-rays, MRIs, and other diagnostic images across the health system, helping providers make faster, more accurate diagnoses. In 2024-25, we added an additional:

SPOTLIGHT

Data for health care decisions

High-quality health data is a foundational asset for delivering better care, guiding policy, and advancing research.

eHealth's data warehouse enables timely and secure access to integrated health system data, supporting dashboards and decision-support tools used by the SHA and the Ministry of Health. These tools provide critical insights into hospital performance, mental health, home care, and

emergency medical services. This helps health system leaders identify trends, allocate resources effectively, and measure outcomes. For clinicians, it means having real-time access to the information needed to make informed decisions that improve patient outcomes. For researchers, it opens new opportunities to study population health, evaluate the impact of interventions, and drive innovation across the health system.

Supporting modern health infrastructure

Digital care needs digital infrastructure. eHealth supports major health capital projects by ensuring new and upgraded hospitals, clinics, and health facilities are equipped with the technology required to support modern care delivery. From initial planning to implementation, eHealth is involved at every stage to ensure these facilities are digitally ready.

In 2024–25, this included:

- Completion of Regina Urgent Care Centre, Regina General Hospital parkade and HealthLine 811 expansion.
- Ongoing support for a range of capital projects across the province, including:
 - Victoria Hospital in Prince Albert
 - Saskatoon City Hospital
 - Royal University Hospital and St. Paul's Hospital in Saskatoon
 - Weyburn General Hospital
 - Long-term care facilities in Grenfell, La Ronge, and Regina
 - Saskatoon Urgent Care Centre
 - Regina Breast Health Centre
- Development of mobile health services like mammography trailers and community wellness buses, helping extend care into rural and remote communities.

Using technology to help deliver better, faster, safer care in Saskatchewan

Behind the scenes, digital tools and systems are helping health care teams across the province provide the right care at the right time. In 2024–25, eHealth supported many of these efforts by managing and expanding the systems that help doctors, nurses, pharmacists, and other care providers work more efficiently and make better decisions for patients.

Faster referrals to specialists

The Referral Management System (RMS) helps doctors send patient referrals to the right specialist with the shortest wait time. It reduces delays and improves access to care by centralizing referrals in key specialty areas. In 2024-25, RMS served:

Information Security

eHealth manages a unified security program through a formal Information Security Management System (ISMS) based on ISO 27001, a globally recognized standard for managing information security. This ISMS framework continues to guide the development and enhancement of appropriate security controls to mitigate risk.

During 2024-25 eHealth made improvements to:

- physical and environmental security to safeguard core infrastructure like our data centres from unauthorized access and disruption
- phishing simulations and security awareness training
- protecting devices connected to networks online and filtering emails to positively influence organizational behaviours and vigilance
- governance structures and internal audit to provide a solid foundation for consistent oversight and continuous improvement

Strengthening the security of Saskatchewan's health system remains a top priority for eHealth. In 2024–25, we continued to advance the maturity of our security program and supporting controls. Key accomplishments included:

- Engaging a managed security services provider to deliver 24/7 continuous security monitoring, enhancing our ability to detect and respond to threats in real time.
- Moving two major projects toward completion:
 - one aimed at strengthening the security of workstations, servers and networked devices
 - one focused on enhancing the identification and management of software vulnerabilities
- Completing the fifth consecutive year of system-wide security awareness training for all IT users, reinforcing a strong security culture.

SPOTLIGHT

eHealth recognized as one of Saskatchewan's Top Employers

Recruitment is key for a growing organization. Being recognized as one of Saskatchewan's top employers makes eHealth more attractive to jobseekers and helps us retain experienced, dedicated employees. Both are key for us as the province's largest IT services organization.

Health Registries & Vital Statistics

Making customer service a top priority

Customer service remained the top focus for Vital Statistics and Health Registries in 2024-25 with implementation of call centre recording, website improvements and customer service training. Teams also put significant focus on tackling a large buildup of citizen requests. These and other changes mean customers receive timely, accurate responses by phone, efficient online ordering processes, and improved turnaround times for vital event certificates and health cards. Turn around times on certificate requests, for example, were at one week as of March 31, 2025.

Health Registries

A Saskatchewan health card is a key requirement for Saskatchewan residents accessing provincially funded health care services and benefits. Health Registries processes new health card applications and updates registration information and health insurance coverage data in the Person Health Registration System.

To improve access to the account residents use to register for and update their health cards, we partnered with Saskatchewan Account to make the services accessible through saskatchewan.ca.

Vital Statistics

Our Vital Statistics team registers and issues certificates for all vital events, including births, stillbirths, marriages and deaths. It also handles legal changes of name.

Speeding up death registrations

eHealth launched the Electronic Death Registration and Notification system in September 2024, allowing physicians, coroners and funeral homes to complete death information online. Integration with other provincial systems helps reduce the wait time for a death certificate and makes it less stressful for loved ones to handle estates and other details. Information is also automatically shared with federal government agencies to reduce overpayment claims, further easing the burden on families.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of eHealth Saskatchewan, which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2025, and the statement of operations, statement of change in net financial assets and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of eHealth Saskatchewan as at March 31, 2025, and the results of its operations, changes in its net financial, and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards.

Basis for Opinion

1. Description of Business

Saskatchewan Health Information Network (SHIN) was established as a Treasury Board Crown Corporation by Order in Council 581/1997 under the provisions of *The Crown Corporations Act, 1993 (Act)* effective August 19, 1997.

SHIN was renamed to eHealth Saskatchewan by Order in Council 734/2010.

eHealth Saskatchewan (eHealth) was created to design, implement, own, operate, and manage a provincial health information network. eHealth's purpose is to foster the development of the health information technology sector, to foster re-engineering of health delivery processes and to protect health information as a strategic resource.

As a Crown entity, eHealth is not subject to income and property taxes from the federal, provincial, and municipal levels of government.

2. Significant Accounting Policies

Pursuant to standards established by the Public Sector Accounting Board (PSAB) and published by Chartered Professional Accountants (CPA) Canada, eHealth is classified as any other government organization. eHealth uses Canadian public sector accounting standards to prepare its financial statements. A statement of remeasurement gains and losses has not been presented in these financial statements because all financial instruments' carrying value approximates their fair value. The following principles are considered to be significant:

a) The Basis of Accounting

The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

b) Revenue

Government transfers are recognized as revenue in the period the transfer is authorized and any eligibility criteria are met. Other revenue is recognized in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

c) Expenses

Expenses represent the cost of resources consumed for operations during the year. Expenses include provision for the amortization of tangible capital assets.

d) Employee Future Benefits

i) Pension Plans - Employees of eHealth participate in one of the following pension plans:

Defined Benefit Plans - Employees participate in the Saskatchewan Healthcare Employees Pension Plan (SHEPP) or the Regina CIVIC Employees Superannuation and Benefit Plan (CIVIC). eHealth's financial obligation to the plans is limited to making the required payments according to the agreements.

Defined Contribution Plan - Employees participate in the Public Employees' Pension Plan (PEPP) which is administered by Plannera Pension Plan (Plannera). eHealth's financial obligation to the plan is limited to making the required payments to this plan according to the PEPP agreement.

ii) Disability income plan - Employees of eHealth participate in several disability income plans to provide wage-loss insurance due to disability. eHealth follows post-employment benefits accounting for its participation in the plans. Accordingly, eHealth expenses all contributions it is required to make in the year.

iii) Accumulated sick leave benefit liability - eHealth provides sick leave benefits for employees that accumulate but do not vest. eHealth recognizes a liability and an expense for sick leave in the period in which employees render services in return for the benefits.

e) Tangible Capital Assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost and are amortized over their useful life. Leased assets are amortized over the life of the lease. Normal maintenance and repairs are expensed as incurred. During development, these assets are recorded based on their percentage of completion and are disclosed as work in progress system development. Amortization is recorded, commencing with the quarter after the assets are placed into service, on a straight-line basis at the annual rates set out below:

Hardware, Software & System Development costs	20% to 33%
Office Furniture & Leasehold Improvements	10% to 20%

f) Non-financial assets

Tangible capital and other non-financial assets are accounted for as assets because they can be used to provide services in future periods. These assets do not normally provide resources to discharge liabilities unless they are sold.

g) Measurement Uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of financial assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingencies and contractual obligations at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. These estimates are reviewed periodically, and, as adjustments become necessary, such adjustments are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known. Significant items that require estimates include amortization and accrued liabilities.

h) Financial instruments

eHealth's financial instruments include due from General Revenue Fund, accounts receivable and accounts payable. The carrying amount of these instruments approximates fair value due to their short-term nature. These instruments have minimal interest, market, liquidity or credit risk. All financial assets are assessed for impairment on an annual basis. When a decline is determined to be other than temporary, the amount of the loss is reported in the Statement of Operations.

i) Leases

Leases that transfer substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership related to the leased property from the lessor to eHealth are accounted for as a capital lease. Other leases are accounted for as operating leases with contractual obligations disclosed in Note 8.

j) Future changes in accounting policies

A number of new Canadian public sector accounting standards and amendments to standards are not yet effective and have not been applied in preparing these financial statements. The following standards will come into effect as follows:

(i.) Conceptual Framework (effective April 1, 2026) replaces Financial Statement Concepts, Section PS 1000, and Financial Statement Objectives, Section PS 1100, which will be withdrawn.

(ii.) PS 1202 Financial Statement Presentation (effective April 1, 2026) a new standard ensuring increased understanding of financial statements and the indicators within them, and provides improved accountability information for users. eHealth plans to adopt these new standards on the effective date and is currently analyzing the impact this will have on its financial statements.

k) Inventory

Inventory at eHealth consists of end user devices (e.g., laptops, monitors) that have not been deployed at March 31, 2025. Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

3. **Due from General Revenue Fund**

Earned interest is calculated and paid by the General Revenue Fund on a quarterly basis into eHealth's bank account using the Government's thirty-day borrowing rate and eHealth's average daily account balance. The Government's average thirty-day borrowing rate in 2025 was 4.05% (2024 - 4.89%).

4. **Budget Approval**

eHealth's budget was approved by the Board on June 26, 2024.

5. **Accumulated Surplus**

eHealth's accumulated surplus is \$74,458 in 2025 (2024 - \$64,717). eHealth's accumulated surplus is \$35,550 after adjusting for tangible capital assets not fully amortized (\$25,694); and designated assets held for specific purposes (\$13,214) (Note 11).

ii) **Maintenance agreements for software**

9. **Deferred Revenue**

As of March 31, 2025, eHealth's deferred revenue balance is \$1,336 (2024 - \$2,429). Deferred revenue is only used once all project planning and due diligence (including stakeholder readiness) is completed and other revenue opportunities are maximized. Deferred revenue consists of unspent amounts provided by the Project Management Board of the Provider Registry System from Saskatchewan and Newfoundland, from Saskatchewan Centre for Patient Oriented Research (SCPOR), Canada Health Infoway and Service Canada.

10. **Employee Future Benefits**

i) **Pension plans**

Employees of eHealth participate in one of three pension plans: the Public Employees Pension Plan (PEPP) which is administered by Plannera, Saskatchewan Healthcare Employees Pension Plan (SHEPP) and the Regina CIVIC Employees Superannuation and Benefit Plan (CIVIC).

PEPP is a defined contribution pension plan. eHealth's financial obligation to the plan is limited to making required payments to match the amount contributed by the employees for current services. eHealth's contribution to this plan is 9% (2024 - 8.6%).

SHEPP and CIVIC are defined benefit pension plans. eHealth's financial obligation to the plan is limited to making required payments as outlined in the plan agreements. eHealth's contribution to these plans are 8.18% and 8.25% respectively.

Pension expense for the year is included in salary and benefits in Schedule 1.

ii) **Disability Income plans**

Employees of eHealth participate in the following disability income plans:

Public Employee Disability Income Plan – Disability income plan for out-of-scope staff are administered by Plannera Pensions and Benefits. eHealth's financial obligation to this plan is limited to making the required payments to the plan according to the applicable agreement. Disability expense for this plan is included in salary and benefits in Schedule 1.

SGEU – Disability income plan for in-scope staff, administered by the Saskatchewan Government and General Employees' Union. eHealth has no financial obligation for this plan.

iii) **Accumulated sick leave benefit liability**

The cost of the accrued benefit obligations related to sick leave entitlement earned by employees is determined using management's best estimate of sick leave usage of active employees. Sick leave liability is included in salary and benefits in Schedule 1.

11. **Designated Assets**

eHealth's designated assets represent Ministry of Health funding committed to developing information technology systems that support frontline delivery and improve access, quality and efficiency of care. eHealth's designated asset balance as at March 31, 2025 is \$13,214 (2024 - \$20,536).
