Re: UPDATE - Moderna SPIKEVAX™ Infant Monovalent Vaccine Shelf-Life Extension Lot 047D22A

On January 13, 2023, the Ministry of Health issued a letter (<a href="https://www.ehealthsask.ca/services/Manuals/Documents/Use%20of%20Pfizer%20%20all%20first%20doses%20age%206mo-5yrs-%202023-01-12.pdf">https://www.ehealthsask.ca/services/Manuals/Documents/Use%20of%20Pfizer%20%20all%20first%20doses%20age%206mo-5yrs-%202023-01-12.pdf</a>) regarding a foreseen temporary shortage of Moderna infant (six months to five years old) vaccine.

There is no longer an expected shortage as a new supply of Moderna's infant vaccine will arrive in Canada in at the end of March 2023. Also, on March 2, 2023, Health Canada granted a shelf-life extension to lot 047D22A until **June 8, 2023**.

• This extension **only applies to vials that have remained frozen**. Once a product is thawed, it can only be stored in the refrigerator at 2-8°C for 30 days.

Immunizers are requested to advise parents and caregivers of young children that

- 1. Children who started their primary series with Moderna infant vaccine may continue their series with Moderna.
- 2. Children who are unimmunized may start their primary series with either Moderna (preferentially recommended for immunocompromised children) OR Pfizer vaccine.
- 3. There is no impact on young children who are only receiving a Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine in their primary series.
