# Measles Facts

## We know that:

- Measles is one of the leading causes of death among young people globally.
- In 2013, there were 145,700 measles deaths globally – about 400 deaths every day or 16 deaths every hour. During 2000-2013, measles vaccination prevented an estimated 15.6 million deaths making measles vaccine one of the best buys in public health (Source: WHO Measles Fact Sheet N°286).
- Measles is no longer endemic in Canada, but outbreaks continue to occur.
- Cases imported from other countries remain an important source of infection.
- Transmission of measles occurs in health-care settings when persons with signs and symptoms compatible with measles are not identified and isolated promptly.

# Measles is a viral illness that can result in:

- Pneumonia
- Encephalitis
- · Middle ear infections
- Subacute sclerosing pan-encephalitis (SSPE)

# **Transmission:**

- Airborne (respiratory spread)
- Must be managed with airborne transmissionbased precautions as per local infection control guidelines.



### **Prevention:**

- The best prevention is vaccination.
- Two doses of a measles-containing vaccine are required at least one month apart.
- All persons born in or after 1970 are eligible for vaccination if not already vaccinated.

**IMMEDIATE notification of all suspect and confirmed cases** to your local Public Health Office is required.
