Re: Reporting of COVID-19 Vaccine Adverse Events of Special Interest – Updated

Dear Colleagues:

The Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) requires reporting of specific Adverse Events of Special Interest (AESI) following immunization with any COVID-19 vaccine using the national Adverse Event Following Immunization (AEFI) reporting form **in section 9d**, available at: https://www.canada.ca/en/public-health/services/immunization/reporting-adverse-events-following-immunization.html.

To complete AEFI reports, refer to the Saskatchewan User Guide for Completion and Submission of Adverse Events Following Immunization (AEFI) Reports at

https://www.ehealthsask.ca/services/Manuals/Documents/SK%20AEFI%20User%20Guide.pdf. Local public health is to inform the Ministry of Health of these AESIs immediately upon notification.

Please assess patients/clients for their history of COVID-19 immunization within the past 28 days upon their presentation to you and document on their medical chart, etc.

COVID-19 vaccine AESIs to be reported immediately to local public health as AEFIs:

- 1. Thrombotic events including:
 - a. Pulmonary embolism
 - b. Venous thromboembolism (VT) e.g., deep vein thrombosis (DVT), phlebitis, thrombophlebitis
 - c. Stroke (if it is possible to confirm if the stroke was embolic or hemorrhagic, please specify)
 - d. Limb ischemia
 - e. Abdominal thrombosis (such as adrenal vein thrombosis, portal/mesenteric vein thrombosis)
 - f. Cerebral venous thrombosis
- 2. Hemorrhagic disease or bleeding disorders (including, for example, abnormal uterine bleeding warranting urgent care)
- 3. Thrombocytopenia
- 4. Other coagulation or blood disorders:
 - a. Disseminated intravascular coagulation (DIC)
 - b. Hemolytic uremic syndrome (HUS)
 - c. Complement disorders

Please share this letter with other healthcare partners as appropriate.
